Following the county council elections on 1st May we can welcome parish councillor Liz Needham as our new representative at county hall. She will be the go-to person for anything county related such as social care and highways for all parts of the village.

I am sure everyone will wish outgoing county councillor Sarah Tallon every success with her career in parliament and thank her for the work she has done for the village over the last 4 years. She is no doubt destined for high office.

One of the big challenges for the village is coexistence with the Segro freight terminal. In the last edition of our magazine Segro had the opportunity to share some of their plans. Going forward the parish council we are looking at three different areas of engagement.

Firstly, it is important to hold Segro to the promises they made when they were granted planning permission by Eric Pickles and the conditions made when the permission was granted. Whilst this falls mainly on the district council, Cllr Keith Loud is already looking at this from a parish perspective and would welcome contact from anyone who is interested in this topic.

Secondly, part of the Segro development are the two new areas of country park in London Colney. One behind Sainsburys and one behind the Pastoral Centre. It is important that these are developed for the long-term benefit of the village as key sustainable amenities for local people to enjoy.

Thirdly, Segro have committed to providing community funding for local projects. It is really important that this money is spent on the communities impacted by the terminal, so we are working with St. Stephens Parish Council (which covers Park Street and Brickett Wood) to ensure a united front in ensuring this is the case, as they receive bids from far and wide for this funding.

Following on from the Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Council Meeting on 15th May, we are looking at broadening engagement through two village meetings in June. These will be themed

"Next Steps for London Colney" on Thursday June 12th at 6pm. Guest speakers will include our MP Daisy Cooper and all will be able to have their say.

"Improving Parking in London Colney" late June, with date to be confirmed. Guest speakers will include Paul de Kort leader of St. Albans District Council.

The second meeting is designed to fit with the parking consultation that will be taking place in London Colney over the summer, designed to give everyone a say on parking.

We're delighted to announce that the Splash Park is now officially open for the summer! It's always a highlight for local families, and we're especially excited to introduce the newly named "Splash Shack", where you can now grab ice creams and refreshments while the children play.

Preparations are well underway for our parish events calendar, with the new Village Day event on 9th August. It promises to be another fantastic community celebration, and we look forward to welcoming residents and visitors alike.

In terms of community facilities, the play parks at Caledon Community Centre and Morris Playing Fields are currently undergoing much-needed updates, including the installation of a long-overdue accessible equipment, ensuring inclusive play opportunities for all children in our parish.

Lastly, we want to inform residents that St Albans District Council will be closing the male and female public toilets on the High Street. However, the accessible disabled toilet will remain open for use by the whole community, ensuring there is still provision for those who need it.

As always, thank you for your continued support and involvement in parish life. We look forward to a vibrant and active summer in London Colney.

A GENEROUS GIFT & LEGACY

On the 5th of March, the small but dedicated grounds team of London Colney Parish Council planted a very special collection of trees kindly donated by Mr. Michael Kennard. These trees had been lovingly nurtured in Mr. Kennard's garden for the past eight years, and he generously offered them to the community, saying they should be put to better use where more people could enjoy them and where they would continue to be cared for.



The planting was no small task - it involved a tractor and trailer, a digger, our newly acquired cargo E-bike, some bonemeal, compost and four eager and 'strapping' members of the Parish Council staff. Together, they successfully planted seven beautiful trees: an Evergreen, a White Cherry, a Straight Willow, a Hornbeam, a Copper Beech, and a striking Black Alder.







These trees now grace the footpath between the Caledon Playing Fields and the council car park at the Caledon Centre. In honour of Mr. Kennard's thoughtful gift, this stretch will be named Kennard Row - a lasting tribute to his generosity and community spirit.

We will continue to nurture these trees in the months and years ahead, and we hope they bring colour, beauty, and joy to all who pass by. They will also support local wildlife and create an important habitat in our area.

PROMOTING ACTIVE TRAVEL &

support of a Greener Together grant and in partnership with local bike company Estarli, has integrated an electric cargo bike into its operations to champion sustainability and environmental education.

One of the most impactful uses of the bike so far has been at local schools - including St Bernadette's Catholic Primary School with plans to include Bowmansgreen Primary School and London Colney Primary School - where it will be used to promote active travel and raise awareness about air pollution and engine idling during school drop-offs.

CHALLENGE

Air pollution around school gates - largely caused by idling vehicles and short car journeys - poses a significant health risk to children. Many schools in the area have voiced growing concerns about traffic congestion, rising emissions, and the need for greater education around climate-conscious travel choices.

Changing these habits requires more than just messaging - it needs positive, visible alternatives that demonstrate leadership and inspire behaviour change.

IMPACT

- · Visibility & Awareness: The bike's presence sparked immediate interest, making pollution and travel choices a topic of conversation among families.
- · School Collaboration: Teachers and pupils engaged in creative ways, helping embed environmental thinking across multiple age groups.
- · Positive Behaviour Change: The bike offered a realworld, fun and functional solution, with many families expressing interest in trying it themselves.



SOLUTION

Solution With the Greener Together-funded cargo e-bike - built by Estarli, based locally in Berkhamsted - the Parish Council delivered a hands-on solution to spark community conversations and drive local action.

The bike will continue to be showcased at the start and end of the school day, supporting wider school campaigns and engagement events focused on clean air and active lifestyles.

ACTIVITIES INCLUDE:

 \cdot Parking the e-cargo bike at school gates during drop-off

and pick-up times to demonstrate a practical, zero-emissions alternative to driving.

- Collaborating with school staff to design and promote anti-idling messaging and Clean Air Day awareness activities.
- · Engaging children in conversations about air quality, travel habits, and how active choices impact their health and the environment.
- · Promoting the upcoming family loan scheme, encouraging parents to trial the bike for their own school runs.

Thanks to the Greener Together grant and our collaboration with Estarli, we've been able to turn a conversation about clean air into action. The cargo bike has made sustainability tangible something children, parents, and staff can see, touch, and try for themselves. It's leadership on wheels, and the school gate is the perfect starting line.



SINGING FOR



Everyone has fun at singing for memory at Sams. 18 months ago we launched Singing for Memory at SAMS where we hold weekly sessions every Monday afternoon in St Albans for people living with memory loss conditions. At our first session we welcomed 5 Participants together with their Companions (a family member, friend or carer). We now regularly welcome 10-15 Participants with their +1 which clearly demonstrates that the sessions are popular, enjoyable and beneficial.

The sessions start with refreshments where everyone sits down to afternoon tea and have the opportunity to chat with each other. Many of the Companions find the opportunity to chat with others in similar situations to be very useful and helps to reduce their feelings of isolation.

Once in the singing circle, we do gentle exercises to promote mobility and play percussion instruments which stimulates co-ordination. Then the singing starts, and there's absolutely no doubt that people living with memory loss conditions benefit enormously from singing songs they remember from times gone by.


You can tell by the smiles on their faces and their laughter that they are enjoying themselves. We end the session with some "Rock & Roll" and "The Twist" and its so wonderful to see those who are able get up and dance. It's the highlight of the sessions.

The feedback from the families is overwhelmingly positive, and many report that after attending a session, they notice their loved one's moods have improved, similarly their appetite, and in many instances they see a reduction in pain.

A recent introduction to the programme is Intergenerational sessions, usually every 4-6 weeks, where babies and pre-school toddlers bring along their grown-up and join in with the fun and games. Who doesn't love a bubble machine and singing "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles"? The older generation certainly enjoy their presence. "The intergenerational group was great. Dad enjoyed it, the babies were a joy and it added an extra dimension and fun to the group" said the daughter of a regular participant.

Our amazing team of volunteers find the sessions so

rewarding too. "It's the best thing I have ever done. When I step through the door, I leave my personal challenges outside in the car park and it's a wonderful thing to be able to make a difference to people's lives" says volunteer Pauline.

Rennie Grove Peace Hospice Care is expanding its Compassionate Café offering in St Albans with the launch of its first CompassionART

Café and a new partnership with a St Albans landmark. Compassionate Cafés are drop-in sessions that provide a safe space for people who have experienced bereavement, or are lonely due to illness, to connect with other people in their community who understand. They are a safe space for people to come together and each session is facilitated by trained volunteers who provide emotional support and a listening ear.

The new CompassionART Café launch builds on the existing format by giving people an opportunity to express themselves through art and crafts. The first Rennie Grove Peace CompassionART Café launched this month at Café on the Corner, on Catherine Street, and will take place on the first Thursday of every month between 2-3.30 pm. For the launch, the café hosted an Easter card making workshop with volunteers from Camphill Village Trust.

Janet attends one of the charity's other Compassionate Cafés where the CompassionART Café format was trialled. After the session she said: "I think this format of combining the chat and

cuppa you get at a Compassionate Café with being creative is really beneficial. I really like the idea of CompassionART Cafés as they give people something to focus on while chatting."

The charity has also launched a new Compassionate Café at St Albans Cathedral, in partnership with Abbots Kitchen and St Albans Cathedral. The first session took place on will be on Monday 7 April, and takes place on the first Monday of each month from 2-3:30pm. As well as giving people a space to talk to others about their loss, trained volunteers will be on hand to listen and provide support.

Alison May is the Community Engagement Manager at Rennie Grove Peace Hospice Care. She says: "Launching our first CompassionART Café will help us tap into the wellbeing benefits of arts and crafts. They help with relaxation and mindfulness, they give people a creative outlet to express themselves.

Art is a fantastic way to convey emotions and reduce stress so we're pleased to be launching our new CompassionART Café to bring this support to local people." Although these drop in sessions are based in St Albans, they are open to anyone based in London Colney, and local residents are encouraged to attend if they feel it could be beneficial to them.

HAVE YOUR SAY



St Albans District Council is going to lead a villagewide Parking Survey to better understand the parking challenges facing residents, businesses, schools, and visitors. Whether you live, work, or travel through the area, we want to hear from you.

WHY THIS MATTERS

Parking across London Colney has become an increasing concern—from congestion on residential roads to inconsiderate parking near schools. The District Council is working to find solutions that balance accessibility, safety, and the needs of the community.

The survey's aim will be to gather your views on a range of important parking issues to help shape future improvements and policies.

WHAT'S BEING CONSIDERED?

The exercise is being approached with an open mind, focusing on the High Street and surrounding areas of the village including Haseldine Road.

Clearly there are significant issues in this area, especially at certain peak times and this is having an impact on local businesses which rely on passing trade.

How any improvements are paid for is a key part of the exercise, charges for parking at public car parks and some on-street locations are made elsewhere in the district. But an open-minded approach needs to consider other options, a local business has already indicated they are considering helping with our parking infrastructure.

And if parking charges were part of the mix, deciding on the duration of any free period before charging started is also an issue to be addressed – 30 minutes for a quick shop or 90 minutes for a meal out.

HOW YOU CAN GET INVOLVED

This is your opportunity to contribute to the way parking is managed in our village. We encourage everyone—residents, shop owners, parents, and commuters—to share their views.

An "Improving Parking in London Colney" meeting is due to be scheduled for late June, with date to be confirmed. Guest speakers will include Paul de Kort leader of St. Albans District Council. This meeting is designed to fit with the parking survey that will be taking place in London Colney over the summer, designed to give everyone a say on parking.

In the meantime, your input is invaluable so please share your thoughts by emailing parking@londoncolney-pc.gov. uk. Your feedback will be received by parish councillors. Let's work together to make parking easier, safer, and fairer for everyone.








PADDINGTON INPERUMENT ABOUT YOU?

STPETERS

It's heartening to see so many events planned this summer for our village, including those celebrating the 200th anniversary of St Peter's Parish Church. We're excited to be part of this wider community celebration.

Having served as vicar here for a year, I've noticed a growing interest in life's deeper questions. Many people I meet are searching for more meaning—seeking a spiritual depth that contrasts with today's culture of instant gratification.

Our church, like many others, has seen encouraging growth, particularly around key festivals such as Christmas and Easter. We were delighted to welcome so many from the village to our Holy Week and Easter services. This renewed engagement suggests we may be entering a season of spiritual renewal.

Whether they are lifelong believers or simply marking significant life events, many people I meet express a desire for greater spiritual insight. This quest spans across a wide spectrum of faith, including those with little or no religious background. Our growing emotional awareness as a society may be contributing to this spiritual searching. One event that reflects this search for meaning—regardless of faith—is our annual Chantry Island Pilgrimage, taking

place this year on 18 June. Pilgrimage has long held significance across cultures and religions, blending physical journeying with spiritual reflection. While our local pilgrimage may not match the scale of routes like the Camino de Santiago, it carries its own rich meaning.

Chantry Island, just west of Shenley Lane, is believed to be the site of an ancient chapel mentioned in the Domesday Book. Legend tells us that in the 4th century, Alban—a Roman living on the island—gave shelter to a Christian priest, Amphibalus, fleeing persecution. Moved by the priest's faith, Alban converted to Christianity. When soldiers came searching, Alban protected Amphibalus by swapping clothes with him. Alban was arrested in his place and executed, becoming Britain's first Christian martyr.



"A perfect environment without the pressures of technology," another parent said. "They're building self-esteem, emotional awareness, and friendships—all through creativity."

From painting and mindfulness to Lego creations, sensory areas, and collaborative games, every session is intentionally designed to nurture children's minds and hearts. The sessions aren't just for kids who need somewhere to go after school—they're for any child who could benefit from a dose of calm and colour in their week.

Home-educating? Doodlebugs has you covered during the day with sessions tailored to suit different learning styles. School holidays? Their holiday club bursts with themed art and crafts and moments of stillness in a usually busy world. Mini ones aren't left out either. The beloved MiniBugs group on Wednesdays and Fridays invites toddlers and their carers into a space of dressing up, painting, role play, and messy joy.

And it's all held together by Mandi, Lenya, and their warm, creative team. As one reviewer summed it up: "Doodlebugs is a gem. A calm, creative space where my child truly thrives. We'd go every day if we could."

Don't just think of it as care. Think of it as connection, creativity, and calm. Book a spot, step away from the screens—and let your child flourish at Doodlebugs.

A WHOLE LOT OF



From time to time the bed of the River Colne flowing through London Colney dries up much to the concern of local residents. However the effects are not so serious to the community as was the case many years ago.

Up to the early 20th century there was no mains water supply to London Colney. Water was obtained from either private wells for those fortunate to have a well within the curtilage of their home or from the village pump. Over several years in the last decade of the 19th century there was a below average rainfall resulting in a water shortage in 1898 which newspaper reports proclaimed as 'London Colney's Water Famine'. The river, private wells and the well supplying the pump were drying up.

The vicar of St Peter's, London Colney, Reverend Thomas Bluett, wrote to the Rural Council commenting on the seriousness of the water shortage. A large number of villagers depended upon the village pump for their drinking water and the pump was unable to cope with the demand although the well supplying it had been deepened.

In order the conserve the supply the handle of the pump was chained up from 10 am until 6 pm during the day. The Herts Advertiser reported that each morning and evening processions of villagers could be seen wending their way to the pump.

One enterprising Albanian was carting water to London Colney and selling it for ½d [half penny] per pail. The obvious solution was to deepen the wells that were running dry but the majority of the wells were supplied from springs and deepening them had the effect of depriving the supply to neighbouring wells. The water shortage was affecting village businesses particularly the local Warwick laundry whose own well was beginning to run dry. The proprietress purchased cart loads of water in order to continue with her business.

A public meeting was held at the village school concerning the condition of the River Colne. An action committee was formed with the aim of persuading the various authorities having an interest in the river to come to an agreement and the Reverend Bluett acted as chairman. The dispute rumbled on and now included Herts County Council, The Thames Conservancy Board and the Local Government Board. By August 1899 the River Colne was flowing again.

The water crisis passed but the supply in London Colney continued to have problems. In 1906 it was reported that the matter had been investigated by the District Medical Officer who reported that 19 of the 33 wells inspected were contaminated with sewage and that the public pump was "very bad". The maintenance and cleanliness of water could only be achieved with a mains supply.

By that year the St Albans Waterworks Company had laid a mains supply as far as Kings Road and were prepared to extend the supply to the River Colne bridge "upon receiving a guarantee that £30 worth of water would be taken per

annum". At a meeting held at London Colney a sufficient number of householders agreed to take the water supply to meet the requirement of the water company. The days of the village pump were soon to be over. London Colney Local History Society.


